

MARKET ALERTS

Asparagus: Mexican production is limited by cold temperatures, Peruvian volumes are decreasing due to quality issues, and markets are expected to stay elevated for the next few weeks.

Celery: Supplies of larger sizes remain limited, but production in Yuma has started, with improved availability expected, while valueadded items continue to face price escalations.

Grapes (Red/Green): Domestic red seedless grapes are available through Christmas, with tight supplies of greens and reds until January, but conditions should improve by mid-January.

Cantaloupe: Offshore melon markets are impacted by port delays, Tropical Storm Sara, and limited supply, with relief from Honduras and Costa Rica not expected until late January or early February, while Mexican melons are also limited and the domestic season has ended.

Honeydew: Prices are elevated due to limited supply, with further pressure from reduced port hours, delayed container ETAs, and the Mexico border closure for commercial crossings during the holiday

Pineapples: Suppliers are prioritizing contracted business while preparing for 2025 contracts. with limited Costa Rican pineapple supply due to heavy rains, causing larger sizes to command a premium, and improved-quality Mexican pineapples more readily available.

Tomatoes: The round tomato market is tight, with limited Florida volumes, premium-priced Mexican large fruit, and increasing Roma supplies facing quality-driven price fluctuations.

DECEMBER 31, 2024 CROP UPDATES

As the produce industry normalizes post-holidays, a potential January 15 port strike threatens to disrupt imports, tighten supplies, and raise costs for key commodities. Close collaboration and proactive communication are crucial to maintaining supply chain stability. Read more

WEATHER

Arizona - A slight cooling is expected Monday with morning lows in the mid-30s to mid-40s, a risk of lettuce icing in some valleys, and highs in the low 70s, rising to the mid-70s by Thursday under a stagnant ridge pattern.

California - A cold high-pressure system will bring morning lows in the upper 20s to low 30s, with daytime highs in the mid 50s to upper 60s. A weak low-pressure system may bring light rain on Friday, with totals under 1/4 inch.

Florida - A series of cold fronts will bring cooler temperatures and a chance of frost in Northern Florida by week's end, with dry weather and gusty winds through January

Mexico - Cool mornings will persist through midweek, with slightly warmer temperatures by week's end, and no rain expected.

FREIGHT

Business is picking up as the holiday season ends. Truck demand will rise, but supply remains steady, with the freight market expected to be very active due to New Year celebrations.



IN PEAK SEASON



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Apples

The apple market is expected to remain steady throughout December. Smaller foodservice sizes will be tight across most varieties, with packouts heavily favoring larger sizes, particularly in Granny Smith and Fuji apples. With schools on holiday break, lighter demand should help stabilize prices.

Mexican production remains extremely limited due to cold temperatures, resulting in reduced yields, though improvements are expected in the coming weeks. Peruvian volumes continue to decline due to quality challenges and seasonality. Markets are likely to remain elevated for at least the next few weeks.

Avocados

Markets remain steady, with a size curve favoring smaller fruit, which is more readily available, while larger fruit remains limited and commands higher prices. As harvests transition to higher elevations and fruit on the trees continues to size up, availability of larger sizes is expected to improve. Strong supplies from Mexico are anticipated, offering excellent promotional opportunities for smaller fruit.

Weather Updates



CALIFORNIA

A cold high-pressure system will settle over the region starting Monday, lasting through mid-week. Morning lows on Monday will dip into the upper 20s to low 30s south of King City, with mid 30s to low 40s elsewhere. By mid-week, temperatures will drop to the low-mid 20s south of King City, upper 20s to low 30s in the Santa Clara Valley, Soledad, and King City, and mid-upper 30s closer to the coast. Daytime highs will remain in the mid 50s to upper 60s throughout the week. A weak low-pressure system will bring a slight chance of rain on Friday, with totals expected to be less than ½ inch.



MEXICO

Cool mornings will continue through midweek, with slightly warmer temperatures later in the week. Light patchy frost is possible in wind-sheltered areas through Wednesday. Daytime temperatures will remain steady, with highs in the low 70s to near 80 by week's end. Lows will range from the low 30s to low 40s through Tuesday, mid 30s to mid 40s on Wednesday, and low to upper 40s Thursday and Friday. No rain is expected over the next five days.



FLORIDA

A series of cold fronts will bring cooler temperatures by midweek, with a chance of frost in Northern Florida by week's end. Expect mostly dry weather through Jan 3rd, with winds gusting 15-20 mph through the start of the month.



ARIZONA

A slight cooling is expected on Monday as high pressure weakens and winds subside. Morning lows will range from the mid-30s to upper 30s in most of Yuma County, with low to mid-40s elsewhere. There's a risk of lettuce icing in Dome and Mohawk Valleys through the week, with light icing possible in Yuma Valley on Tuesday. Highs will be in the low 70s for most fields, with little change expected throughout the week. By Thursday and Friday, temperatures may reach the mid to upper 70s under a stagnant ridge pattern.

Freight Updates

The pace of business is picking up this week with many preparing for the holidays end. We expect to see an uptick in demand for trucks, and are confident supplies will be good. Being several nationalities tend to celebrate the New Year, we expect the freight market to be very active.

As we move past the holidays, which fell in the middle of the week and disrupted everyday routines, the produce industry is transitioning to a more regular schedule. However, this sense of normalcy may be shortlived as we brace for the potential impact of a looming port strike that could have widespread effects on imported commodities.

The current contract extension between the International Longshoremen's Association (ILA) and the U.S. Maritime Alliance (USMX) expires at midnight on January 15, 2025.

Negotiations collapsed in November, and there are no formal plans to reconvene, increasing the likelihood of a strike. Should it occur, it would disrupt operations at 36 container ports along the East and Gulf Coasts, from Texas to Maine.

For the produce industry, the timing couldn't be worse. Grapes from Chile and Peru and melons from Central America rely heavily on these ports for distribution across the U.S. Any delays or disruptions would continue to tighten supplies and drive up costs when the industry is still recovering from holiday slowdowns.

Importers and distributors are already facing challenges from recent weather events impacting domestic crops. Grapes, expected to ramp up in volume through January, could see delays that compress the supply chain, leading to spot shortages and elevated prices. Similarly, melons could face logistical bottlenecks that disrupt their timely deliveries.

To mitigate the impact, closely coordinating with logistics partners will be key for minimizing disruptions. It's also crucial to communicate transparently with customers about potential challenges and adjustments to supply schedules.

Beyond immediate logistics, the industry must remain vigilant and advocate for a resolution. These efforts are essential for maintaining the integrity of the supply chain and ensuring that fresh produce remains accessible to consumers nationwide.

While the New Year promises a fresh start, the looming port strike reminds us of the fragile balance within the produce supply chain. As an industry, our ability to adapt and collaborate will determine how effectively we navigate these challenges and continue delivering the quality and consistency our customers expect.
