

Avocados: Strong markets for 48ct+; 60ct/70ct seeing relief. California's light start due to tight Mexican supply, ramping up late Feb/early March.

Blackberries: Lighter supply this week due to cold weather, but warmer temps expected to boost production in Central Mexico.

Raspberries: Low production due to cold weather and trimmings, shortages expected until next week. Warmer temps in mid-February should help yields.

Cauliflower: Supplies are tight due to cold weather, with prices expected to rise.

Celery: Supplies are light to moderate, with limited large sizes and good quality despite minor seeder issues.

Limes: Slight price increase this week, strong market activity through February. Smaller limes expected with fewer larger sizes.

Iceberg Lettuce: Lighter production in Yuma due to cold temps, causing price gaps. Issues with misshapen heads and discoloration. Moderate supply expected with warmer temps next week.

Lettuce Leaf: Lighter availability of romaine, green, and red leaf, with blistering and peeling. Romaine heart production down. No escalations on value-added items.

Tender Leaf Lettuce: Lower yields of cilantro, arugula, and spinach due to cold temps. Tight supplies expected into next week.

Cantaloupe: Supply is limited by port delays and storm damage, with quality affected and triggered pricing through February 3rd.

JANUARY 29, 2025 CROP UPDATES

Cold temperatures in the Southwestern desert will slow growth, potentially causing supply shortages. Leafy greens may show wind burn, discoloration, and smaller sizes, while processed items like spinach and spring mix could have reduced shelf life and quality. Careful rotation management is recommended. Read more

WEATHER

Arizona - Cold morning lows will continue until Friday, with Yuma Valley lows in the upper 20s to mid-30s. Highs will range from the upper 50s to 60s today, warming to the 70s to mid-80s by Sunday.

<u>California</u> - Dry conditions and belowaverage temperatures will persist through Friday, with morning lows in the upper 20s to mid-30s, and highs in the low 50s to mid-60s. A slight chance of rain and warmer temperatures are expected over the weekend.

Florida -Warm temperatures and dry conditions will persist until Friday, with a few isolated showers expected. Winds will gust between 15 to 22 mph in southeast Florida and Tampa Bay.

<u>Mexico</u> - Warm temperatures will continue, with isolated showers expected later in the week. Highs will range from the mid-70s to mid-80s, and lows will be in the low 40s to upper 40s.

FREIGHT

Freight this week has faced transit issues due to ice and snow out west, and low temps affecting harvest in the southern growing regions from Arizona to Florida. Shipper delays and long wait times are going to be common. Expect weather to get better next week.



MARKET ALERTS

Honeydew: Prices remain high due to limited supply, with relief expected next week from improving Mexican supplies.

Pears: In tight supply until mid-July, with Washington's crop down 25-50%, and prices for Anjou pears are rising

Pineapples: Demand is high, with supplies tight until mid-April due to heavy rainfall and boosted by Valentine's Day demand.

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Apples

The apple market remains steady, with Honeycrisp as the exception down about 38% from last year and expected to see continued price increases. Washington's crop is skewing toward larger sizes, tightening supplies of smaller foodservice apples, especially Granny Smith and Fuji.

Weather Updates



CALIFORNIA

"High pressure will maintain dry conditions with near to below-average temperatures through Friday. Morning lows will range from the upper 20s to mid-30s in the Santa Ynez Valley and Cuyama, with low 30s to low 40s elsewhere. Daytime highs will stay in the low 50s to mid-60s.

A low-pressure system will pass mostly to the north this weekend, bringing a slight chance of rain. Increased cloud cover will lead to slightly warmer temperatures, with morning lows in the upper 30s to low 50s and daytime highs in the low 60s to low 70s."



MEXICO

Warm temperatures will persist through the weekend. Isolated showers may develop toward the end of the week, with potential rainfall ranging from 0.02" to 0.20" in affected areas. Highs will reach the mid-70s to mid-80s today, then settle in the low 70s to low 80s from Thursday through Sunday. Overnight lows will range from the low to upper 40s across most areas through February 2nd.



FLORIDA

Warm temperatures will continue across the region through the weekend. Dry conditions will persist through Thursday, with a few isolated showers expected Friday into Saturday over northern Florida. Rainfall totals will range from trace amounts to 0.15" in most areas. Dry weather will return Saturday evening and continue through Sunday. Winds will gust between 15 to 22 mph across southeast Florida and the Tampa Bay area through the end of January.



ARIZONA

Dry conditions with cold morning lows will continue through Friday, followed by a warming trend into the weekend. Yuma County valleys will see lows in the upper 20s to mid-30s, rising to the mid-30s to low 40s by Sunday. Wenden will hover in the mid-20s through Friday, warming to the mid-30s. Central Arizona and southeast California will see lows in the mid-30s to low 40s, increasing to the mid-40s by Sunday. Highs will range from the upper 50s to 60s today, climbing to the 70s to mid-80s by Sunday afternoon.

Grop Appdates

Cold temperatures in the Southwestern desert growing regions are forecast to continue throughout the week. These desert fields will see very cold morning temperatures with moderate lettuce ice across the region into Saturday before a warming trend begins next week. These very cold temperatures currently will slow growth rates to a crawl in the desert regions possibly causing some supply shortages down the road.

The leafy green fields will continue to show some wind and fringe burn, feathering/epidermal peeling, blister and discoloration in upcoming harvests. Along with blister and epidermal peel and blister you can expect to see lighter color and carton weights and smaller head size as growers trim out damaged outer leaves.

On the processing side extreme cold can cause physiological changes in the plants causing leaf sensitivity and weaker overall texture. This can result in increased mechanical damage and bruising during harvest and processing. Processed leafy green items will also likely see an increase in discoloration and breakdown showing up in the bag affecting shelf life. Spinach, tender leaf, and spring mix items tend to be most susceptible to weather fluctuations due to being harvested at a very young stage. The spring mix and tender leaf items will continue to show some yellowing, discoloration, and breakdown in the bag along with weaker texture and lesser shelf life due to the growing conditions in the region.

It is important to keep your rotations in check as overall quality and shelf life of many crops, especially processed items, will be challenged in the near term.
