Commodity of the Month - Asparagus

MARKET ALERTS

Avocado: Markets are steady, but rising field costs and limited harvests may impact pricing. California's harvest is limited due to rain, with peak sizes in the medium range. Elevated markets are expected until Mexican supply improves.

Bell Peppers: Green pepper prices are higher as production has passed its peak, and cooler weather has slowed output. Red bell supplies are good, with Canadian shipments starting in a few weeks. The Nogales season will run through May, transitioning to Coachella in June, starting with green peppers and followed by red bells.

Blackberries: Available quantities are lower than expected this week, with a significant amount of CMex transfer fruit being rejected at the border due to quality concerns.

Raspberries: Supplies remain limited with higher market prices, but we expect availability to improve in late March as warmer weather arrives on the West Coast of California.

Strawberries: Strawberries are available from Texas, Florida, Santa Maria, Oxnard, and Baja California. Florida's production is declining, while new crop California and Baja fruit will increase. Central Mexico's production will drop, and rain on the West Coast may disrupt production this weekend.

Pineapple: Pineapple supply will remain tight until mid-April, with peak volumes in May. Flexibility in sizes is needed as Costa Rican pineapples dominate, and lower yields from rain may impact availability and pricing.

MARCH 12, 2025 CROP UPDATES

Cold systems will bring rain and winds to California and Northern Mexico, impacting harvests, especially strawberries in Santa Maria, Oxnard, and Northern Baja. Citrus and avocado harvests may be delayed, and weather could affect transition supplies, increasing disease pressure and disrupting schedules. <u>Read more</u>

WEATHER

California: Heavy rain and winds up to 35 mph are expected through Thursday night, followed by lighter showers on Friday and more rain Sunday night.

Mexico: Warm temperatures and dry weather will continue through the weekend, with highs in the low 80s to near 90 and lows in the mid 40s to 50s.

Florida: Mornings will warm through the week, with dry weather until Saturday, followed by increased showers on Sunday and gusty winds through March 14th.

Arizona: Rain will end early Wednesday, with a cold front bringing moderate showers and gusty winds through Thursday, followed by cooler temperatures and light rain through Friday.

FREIGHT

This week, snow over low lying passes will impact California travel affecting transit between Californias Central Valley and the Desert Cities. Expect that front to move east dropping snow over Interstate 40 creating winter driving conditions and possible closures.



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CALIFORNIA

A strong low-pressure system is bringing moderate to heavy showers and wind gusts up to 35 mph through Thursday night, with rain totals ranging from ¾" to 2". Morning lows will drop to the low 30s to mid 40s, while daytime highs will cool to the upper 40s to low 60s. A second, weaker system will move in on Friday, bringing light to moderate showers through Friday night, with rain totals expected between a tenth and half inch. After a dry weekend, the next system will arrive Sunday night, bringing more rain.



MEXICO

Warm temperatures and dry weather are expected to continue over the fields of Central Mexico through the weekend, with little change in the next five days. Highs will range from the low 80s to near 90, while lows will be in the mid 40s to mid 50s through March 16th.



FLORIDA

Mornings will gradually warm throughout the week, with daytime highs also rising by the weekend. Dry weather is expected through Saturday, but showers are likely to increase on Sunday with the approach of a trough. Winds will gust between 15 to 20 mph through March 14th.



ARIZONA

Rain chances in southeast California and Yuma on Tuesday afternoon will end by around 3 AM Wednesday, followed by dry conditions until an unseasonably strong cold front arrives in Coachella Valley around 4 AM Thursday. This system will move through the low deserts, bringing moderate to heavy showers through Thursday afternoon, with isolated thunderstorms possible in the Phoenix area. Light rain will continue in central Arizona into the late evening, with additional light rain expected Friday night. Southerly winds will increase, gusting to 20 mph on Wednesday afternoon and evening, peaking at 25-35 mph on Thursday afternoon. Morning lows will be in the low 40s on Wednesday, cooling to the mid 30s to low 40s by Friday, with temperatures gradually warming into the weekend.

Prop Updates

A series of cold low-pressure systems are once again set to move through California, Northern Mexico and Southwestern Arizona this week. These systems will bring rain, strong winds and cooler temperatures to these regions into early next week. Central and Southern California will take the brunt of these systems with less rain expected across the Desert regions. This may hinder some harvests in the region in the muddy conditions depending on how much rain is received. Mildew pressure will be on the rise with insect populations remaining problematic as the season winds down.

Of most concern is the strawberry production in Santa Maria, Oxnard and Northern Baja as these regions are forecast to receive strong winds and moderate rainfall with lighter rain expected across Northern Baja. Following the rains, growers will once again cull and strip damaged fruit to induce growth and help the plants recover. Citrus and Avocado harvests in California will likely be delayed by a few days as these systems roll through.

The upcoming transition supplies across Central and Southern California will receive cold temperatures and substantial precipitation with these systems. The precipitation will likely increase mold, mildew and disease pressure in these upcoming stands. Field personnel are currently evaluating the fields in between recent storm systems. These stands have seen generally good growing conditions since seeding. The current weather pattern of cooler temperatures and rain may impact transition schedules currently set for late March into early April.

As always, upcoming weather patterns will play a crucial role with supplies and quality moving forward. At this point we will have to wait and see how these fields come through these storms.
